

1. **Poll Schedule-** All ballots must be postmarked no later than the day of the election (November 6, 2018) if mailed or received by the county auditor by 8:00 p.m. the day of the election if returned in person. Voters may drop off ballots at voting centers set up by their county auditor, which will be open during business hours 18 days (beginning October 19, 2018) before the election until 8:00 p.m. on the day of the election. A voter who is in line or inside at a voting center by 8:00 p.m. has the right to vote.
2. **Voter ID-** You must either have valid photo identification or sign a ballot declaration in order to vote in person at a voting center. If you sign, then the poll worker will compare your signature to the signature on file. If you are unable to sign, then the poll workers will require you to be identified by another registered voter. If you **DO NOT HAVE** photo identification, you can cast a provisional ballot that will be counted if the signature on your ballot declaration that accompanies your provisional ballot matches the signature on your voter registration record. Acceptable forms of ID include:

<ul style="list-style-type: none">- A driver's license,- State identification card,- Student identification card,- Tribal identification card, or- Employer identification card.	<p>Some acceptable alternate forms of identification are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Copy of a current utility bill- Current bank statement- Copy of a current government check- Copy of a current paycheck- A government document that shows both your name and address
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3. **Accessibility-** All voting centers must be accessible to persons with disabilities. You have the right to vote using a voting booth accessible to individuals who use a wheel chair or are blind or visually impaired, enabling you to vote with privacy and independence.
4. **Assistance at Polls-** If a voter cannot read, write or speak English or they are blind or otherwise physically disabled, they have the right to receive help with voting by a person of their choice except the judge of elections, the voter's employer or an agent of the employer, or an officer or agent of the voter's union. You may also ask two election officers to enter the voting booth and record your vote as you direct.
5. **If a voter has moved-** If a voter has moved and did not update their address by the deadline, the voter can contact the county auditor and vote according to his or her previous address.
6. **Mistake ballot-** If a voter makes a mistake or "spoils" their ballot before casting it, a voter is entitled to a replacement ballot. The voter can request a replacement ballot by contacting the county auditor or obtaining a ballot at a voting center
7. **Polling place boundary-** Voters have the right to wait to vote (or to vote) without anyone electioneering or trying to influence their vote in any other way within a voting center.
8. **Provisional ballots-** A voter has the right to vote by provisional ballot if there is ever a doubt about their right to vote. The voting center must provide the voter with information on how to determine whether a provisional ballot was counted and, if applicable, why the voter's provisional ballot was not counted. **However, a provisional ballot should be a last resort.**
