

1. **Poll Schedule** – On Election Day, each polling place will be open from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Eastern Time. A voter in line or inside the polling place by 9 p.m. must be allowed to vote.
2. **Voter ID** – Most voters are not required to provide any ID. A voter must, however, provide poll inspectors with their name and address of residence, and sign their name on the back of their registration poll record. Only some first-time voters are required to provide ID, which can include:
 - A current driver’s license, a DMV-issued non-driver photo ID, or other current, valid photo ID (e.g., student ID, passport, employee ID); OR
 - A copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows the name and address of the voter.
3. **Accessibility** – All polling places should be accessible to voters with disabilities. Every polling place is required to contain at least one voting machine that can accommodate voters with disabilities, including non-visual accessibility for the blind and visually impaired.
4. **Assistance at the Polls** – A voter who is blind, physically disabled or cannot read English has the right to receive help in order to vote from a person of their choice, so long as the person is not the voter’s employer, an agent of the voter’s employer, or an officer or agent of the voter’s union. The voter also has the option to receive assistance from two election officials of different political parties.
5. **If a Voter Has Moved** – If a registered voter has moved within the same county (or within New York City) prior to the election, they have the right to vote with an affidavit ballot at the polling place of their NEW residence. If a voter has moved to a different county, they MAY be eligible to vote for president and vice president—call 866-OUR-VOTE for assistance.
6. **Mistake Ballot** – If a voter makes a mistake or “spoils” their ballot before casting it, the voter is entitled to another ballot upon returning the spoiled ballot to the election officers. Any eligible voter is entitled to up to two replacement ballots.
7. **Polling Place Boundary** – Voters have the right to wait to vote (and to vote) without anyone electioneering or trying to influence their vote in any way, within 100 feet of any entrance to their polling place.
8. **Affidavit Ballots** – A voter has the right to vote by affidavit ballot if the voter believes they are properly registered to vote and: (a) the voter’s name does not appear on the list of registered voters for the precinct and their eligibility to vote cannot otherwise be established; or (b) a first-time voter does not provide appropriate identification if required; or (c) the voter’s eligibility to vote has been challenged by a poll watcher or other voter. **However, an affidavit ballot should be a last resort.**
