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**Note:** This FAQ is not exhaustive. Situations or inquiries may arise that are not answered below. In those circumstances, contact your hotline captain or command center for assistance. Please make sure to record all of the voter's contact information should follow-up be necessary.

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## REGISTERING TO VOTE

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### 1. STATUS: Am I registered to vote?

You can determine if you are registered to vote by visiting <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-voter/voter-info>. You can update your registration by visiting <https://vote.utah.gov/>.

You can also contact your county clerk's office with any questions regarding your registration. Contact information for county clerks can be found here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

### 2. HOW: How do I register to vote? What if I don't have access to a computer and/or printer?

You may register through one of the following methods:

- Register with a paper form. Fill out a paper registration form and mail or email a scanned copy to your county clerk. A link for the paper registration form is available here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/wp-content/uploads/sites/42/2020/05/Voter-Registration-Form5-20-4.pdf>. You can find your county clerk's contact information here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>. Be prepared to send a copy of required identification along with your application. See questions 3 and 36 below.
- Register online at the website [voter.utah.gov](http://voter.utah.gov). A valid Utah driver license or valid Utah ID is required.
- Register in-person at your county clerk's office. You can find your county clerk's contact information in the link above. Be prepared to provide the required identification discussed in questions 3 and 36 below.

If you don't have access to a computer and/or printer, you may register in-person at your county clerk's office.

For the 2020 regular general election, check with your county clerk to ensure that you are permitted to register at their office.<sup>1</sup> Contact information for county clerks can be found here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

### 3. IDENTIFICATION: What ID is required to register to vote?

It depends if you wish to register online, in-person, or by mail.

- To register online, you must have a valid Utah driver license or valid Utah ID.<sup>2</sup>
  - If your current address does not match the address on your Driver's License and you are attempting to register online, first, update your Utah Driver's License address online at <https://secure.utah.gov/dlr/main/info.html>, then register.<sup>3</sup>

- To register in-person or by mail, you must fill out a paper form that among other items, asks you to provide your Utah driver license number, a valid Utah ID, or the last four digits of your Social Security number. Your voter registration form must be received by your county clerk’s office by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, October 23, 2020.
  - If you are registering to vote in person before the registration deadline, you should take a valid form of voter identification discussed in question 36 below and proof of residence.
  - If you are registering to vote for the first time and voting by mail, you may need to provide a copy of the necessary identification to your county clerk’s office.<sup>4</sup> Please see question 36 below for what form of ID is required.
  - If you are registering in person after the registration deadline, you must have a valid form of voter identification (see question 36 below) and proof of residence.<sup>5</sup>

Even if you have the required form of ID, this does not guarantee your ability to register. To register, you must also be:

- A U.S. citizen;
- A resident of Utah for at least 30 days before the election;
- 18 years old on or before the day of the election; and
- A current resident of the voting district or precinct where you apply to vote.<sup>6</sup>

You are generally considered a “resident” if you intend to live in Utah permanently or indefinitely.<sup>7</sup> The place where you currently reside is the place where you intend to return whenever you are away.<sup>8</sup>

For example, even if you have been away from the state within 30 days before election, you may still be eligible to vote so long as you can show you are a “resident” of Utah and currently reside within the precinct where you are currently registered to vote. You can use this link to change the address to which you would like an absentee ballot sent: <https://vote.utah.gov/>. Conversely, even if you have lived in Utah temporarily for more than 30 days, this may not enable you to vote in the state.

#### **4. DEADLINES: When is/was the voter registration deadline? Are there different deadlines whether I register by mail, in-person, online or on Election Day?**

Your voter registration must be *received* by your county clerk before 5:00 pm on Friday, October 23, 2020. This deadline applies regardless of how you choose to register.<sup>9</sup> You can find your county clerk’s contact information here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

If you miss this deadline, regardless of how you attempted to register, you can still register by provisional ballot during the early voting period, if applicable, or on election day, by visiting you polling place.<sup>10</sup> However, you will need to bring a valid voter identification described in question 36 *and* proof of residence.<sup>11</sup>

For the 2020 Regular General Election, you may be able to cast a provisional ballot by mail.<sup>12</sup> You are encouraged to contact your county clerk with any questions.

**5. SAME DAY: Does my state have Same Day Registration (i.e. I can register to vote the same day I vote)? If so, what is the process?**

Yes, but you must bring a valid voter identification, as described in question 36, *and* proof of residence.<sup>13</sup>

Registering the same day means you will cast a provisional ballot.<sup>14</sup> Your provisional ballot will be counted if:

- you are otherwise legally entitled to vote the ballot,
- the ballot is identical to the ballot for the precinct in which you reside,
- the information on the provisional ballot is complete, and
- you provide valid voter identification and proof of residence to the poll worker.<sup>15</sup>

**6. PERMANENT MOVE: I have moved permanently and I didn't update my voter registration, can I vote?**

Yes, you can vote, but you must affirm the change of address orally or in writing before the election judge. <sup>16</sup> You will not need to re-register. **7. TEMPORARY MOVE: I have moved temporarily due to Covid-19 or some other reason. Where can I vote?**

You can vote in person in the county where you currently reside.<sup>20</sup> You “currently reside” wherever you intend to return once your temporary move is over (see question three above or question eight below).

Alternatively, you can vote by mail. If you are an active registered voter, you will automatically receive a ballot in the mail for the 2020 regular general election.<sup>21</sup>

Although your ballot will not be forwarded to a new address, you can use this link to update your ballot mailing address: <https://vote.utah.gov/>. You must update your address, if necessary, no later than Friday, October 23, 2020.<sup>22</sup>

The county clerk where you are registered will mail ballots between October 13, 2020 and October 27, 2020. If you are registered to vote in San Juan County, your ballot may be mailed sooner. If you do not receive a ballot shortly after this time, contact your county clerk's office. Contact information for your county clerk is available here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

**8. STUDENT: I am a college student. Can I register to vote where I go to school? What if I am taking classes remotely? Where can I vote?**

It depends.

If you are a resident of Utah, attending school away from home, and registered to vote, then even if you are attending classes remotely while away from home, you can request a mail ballot to be sent to your current address.<sup>23</sup> You can use this link to update your ballot mailing address, but you must do so no later than Friday, October 23, 2020: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.<sup>24</sup> If you believe you are a resident of Utah but are not registered in Utah, you may still be able to vote in Utah, even if you attend school out of state. See question two above for ways to register.

If you are a student from out of state, you may register to vote in Utah if you can establish your identity and residence by a preponderance of the evidence.<sup>25</sup> To establish your residence, generally, this means that you must show that you intend to live in Utah permanently or indefinitely and have held this view for at least the 30 days immediately before the election.<sup>26</sup> You must also prove that your principal place of residence is in the county where you are attempting to register to vote. So, if you do not intend to live permanently or indefinitely in Utah, it may not be possible for you to register to vote in this state. Still, if you have questions, please contact the county clerk for the county where you currently live.

If you are registered to vote in Utah, you can vote at your polling location during early voting hours or on election day when the polls are open.<sup>27</sup> You can learn more about where you can vote by visiting this website: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>. You can also vote by mail and are encouraged to do so for the 2020 regular general election.<sup>28</sup>

**9. LIVING ABROAD: I am living abroad and/or am serving in the military. How can I register and/or vote?**

First,<sup>29</sup> complete a ballot. Please be prepared to provide a copy of your valid Utah driver license or valid Utah ID. The link to register online is available here: [https://secure.utah.gov/voterreg/login.html?selection=VOTE\\_BY\\_MAIL](https://secure.utah.gov/voterreg/login.html?selection=VOTE_BY_MAIL). The link to the paper form is available here: <https://www.fvap.gov/uploads/FVAP/Forms/fpca.pdf>. You may find your county clerk's contact information here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

Second,<sup>30</sup> submit your ballot. If you register online, your ballot will be submitted. If you complete a paper copy, you must mail or send the completed form electronically.

For the 2020 regular general election, your county clerk must receive your request by Thursday, October 29, 2020, and your ballot must be postmarked by November 2, 2020 or received by email or fax by 8:00 p.m. (mountain time) on November 3, 2020.<sup>31</sup>

If you are registered but did not receive a ballot and would like to vote, you can submit the Federal Write-in Absentee Ballot, available here: <https://www.fvap.gov/uploads/FVAP/Forms/fwab.pdf>.

If you submit your ballot via email or fax, please note that state law requires you to waive your right to a secret ballot. If you prefer to keep your ballot secret, you may request a mail ballot instead.<sup>32</sup>

**10. CRIMINAL CONVICTION: I have a criminal conviction. Can I vote?**

It depends.

If you have been convicted of a misdemeanor, you may vote if you are sentenced to probation or have successfully completed the term of incarceration to which you were sentenced.<sup>33</sup>

If you have been convicted of a felony, you may vote once you are granted parole, sentenced to probation, or have successfully completed your term of incarceration.<sup>34</sup>

**11. INCARCERATED: I am currently in jail. Can I vote?**

No.

Voting rights for a misdemeanor or felony convictions are not restored until you are sentenced to probation, successfully complete your term of incarceration, or, additionally in the instance of a felony conviction, granted parole.<sup>35</sup>

**12. NOT ON ROLLS AT POLLING PLACE: I am at my polling place and am not on the voter registration roll. Can I vote where I am?**

Yes, although you will cast a provisional ballot.<sup>36</sup>

For your provisional ballot to count, you will need to have a valid form of identification and proof of residence that establishes you are otherwise entitled to vote.<sup>37</sup>

Your provisional ballot will not count if an election officer determines that you are not registered to vote and your provisional ballot cannot be treated as a registration form, or that you are not legally entitled to vote the ballot.<sup>38</sup>

**13. THOUGHT WAS REGISTERED: My name isn't on the voter registration roll but I thought I was registered. Could it have been removed? What do I do?**

First, it is possible it was removed. Second, you are encouraged to consider casting a provisional ballot. To prepare for this possibility, you should be prepared to present a form of valid voter identification discussed in question 36 *and* proof of residence when you vote.

A county clerk may not remove the names of voters from the official register during the 90 days before Election Day unless the voter requests, in writing, that her name be removed.<sup>39</sup> If you do not believe you have done this, it is possible your name was inadvertently removed. You may find your voter registration information here: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.

If you were removed, consider if any of the following events may have occurred, which could explain why your name is not on the registration roll. But, even if you do not show up, you may still cast a

provisional ballot, which will be counted if you bring a valid voter identification and proof of residence discussed in question 36 with you plus you are otherwise legally entitled to vote at that polling place.<sup>40</sup>

A voter's name will be removed from the official register if:

- The voter confirms in writing that the voter has changed residence to a place outside the county;
- The county clerk has received confirmation from the Department of Health's Bureau of Vital Records that the voter is deceased;
- The county clerk receives written confirmation from the voter that the voter no longer resides within the county clerk's county;
- The county clerk has obtained evidence that the voter's residence has changed, the clerk mailed notice to the voter, the voter failed to respond to the notice or did not submit information that confirms the voter's residence, and the voter failed to vote or appear to vote in either of the next two regular general elections after the date of the notice;
- The voter requests, in writing, that the voter's name be removed from the official register;
- The county clerk receives a returned voter identification card, determines there was no clerical error causing the card to be returned, and has no further information to contact the voter;
- The county clerk receives notice that a voter has been convicted of any felony or certain misdemeanors and the voter's right to vote has not been restored; or
- The county clerk receives notice that a voter has registered to vote in another state after the day on which the voter registered to vote in Utah.<sup>41</sup>

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## HOW TO VOTE: EARLY VOTING

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### **14. AVAILABILITY: Is there early voting in my state (whether called early voting or in person absentee voting)? When is it?**

Yes. It begins on October 20, 2020 and lasts until at least Friday, October 30, 2020.<sup>42</sup> If you have any questions, you are encouraged to contact your county clerk, whose contact information is available here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

Voters in San Juan County will have limited in-person early voting. You may find dates and locations here: <http://sanjuancounty.org/sjc-content/documents/Early%20Voting%20Flyer.pdf>.

### **15. ELIGIBILITY: Do I have to have a reason to vote early?**

No.<sup>43</sup>

### **16. WHEN: When do the polls open/close during early voting?**

At least 19 days before the date of the election, notice of the dates, time, and locations of early voting will be published on your county's website.<sup>44</sup>



For the 2020 regular general election, this information must be posted by at least October 15, 2020. You can find your county's website here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>. Voters in San Juan County will have limited in-person early voting. You may find dates and locations for San Juan County here: <http://sanjuancounty.org/sjc-content/documents/Early%20Voting%20Flyer.pdf>.

As long as you arrive at the polls before the time that they are scheduled to close, you are allowed to vote.<sup>45</sup>

Despite the option to vote early in person, Utah encourages voters to vote by mail for the 2020 regular general election.<sup>46</sup>

### **17. WHERE: Where do I vote during early voting?**

At least 19 days before the date of the election, notice of the dates, time, and locations of early voting will be published on your county's website.<sup>47</sup>

For the 2020 regular general election, this information must be posted by at least October 15, 2020. You can find your county's website here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>. Voters in San Juan County will have limited in-person early voting. You may find dates and locations for San Juan County here: <http://sanjuancounty.org/sjc-content/documents/Early%20Voting%20Flyer.pdf>.

You may also return your absentee ballot by mail to the county clerk's office or place it in a designated drop box before election day. To view drop box locations in your county, enter your address at the link here: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.

Despite the option to vote early in person, Utah encourages voters to vote by mail for the 2020 regular general election.<sup>48</sup>

### **18. IDENTIFICATION: What identification is required for early voting? Can I vote without providing identification?**

The identification required for early voting is the same as for voting on Election Day,<sup>49</sup> and no, you may not vote at early voting without providing identification.<sup>50</sup>

If you are not registered to vote, you may still vote early by registering to vote at a polling place that is open for early voting.<sup>51</sup> But, you must be otherwise eligible to register to vote in that county, and present a valid form of identification and proof of residence. Please see question five above for the requirements to register and question thirty-six for the form of identification required for voting by provisional ballot.

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## HOW TO VOTE: ABSENTEE AND/OR VOTE BY MAIL

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### **19. AUTOMATIC: Do I have to request an absentee ballot or will my state mail me one automatically? How do I request one?**

No.

For the 2020 regular general election, you will automatically receive a ballot in the mail if you are an active registered voter.<sup>52</sup>

You can use this link to determine if you are an active registered voter:

Your county clerk will mail ballots between October 13, 2020 and October 27, 2020,<sup>53</sup> although if you are registered to vote in San Juan County, your ballot may be mailed sooner.

If you do not receive a ballot shortly after this time, immediately contact your county clerk's office:  
<https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

If you desire your ballot to be mailed to an alternative address, you may change your address using the following link, but you must change your address no later than Friday, October 23, 2020:  
<https://vote.utah.gov/>.<sup>54</sup>

If you are not an active registered voter, for the 2020 regular general election, your voter registration must be received by your county clerk before 5:00 p.m. on Friday, October 23, 2020. However, you may register to vote at an early voting location or at a polling location on Election Day, but then you must take a valid voter identification and proof of residence with you. You must also be otherwise entitled to vote at that early voting location or polling place.<sup>55</sup> You may also register to vote after the deadline by sending a correctly completed voter registration form to the county clerk, but you will still be required to vote by provisional ballot.<sup>56</sup> For the 2020 regular general election, you may be able to cast a provisional ballot by mail.<sup>57</sup> For further information on how to register and if you are eligible to register, see the section titled "Register to Vote" above.

### **20. APPLICATION DEADLINE: What is the deadline for requesting an absentee ballot?**

The last day for an election officer to send an absentee ballot to you is seven days before election day, and election officers will begin to mail ballots twenty one days before election day.<sup>58</sup> For the 2020 regular general election this means Tuesday, October 27, 2020 is the last day an election officer may mail an absentee ballot. To receive such ballot, you must also be registered before then. However, you may be able to request and cast a provisional ballot by mail for the 2020 regular general election too.<sup>59</sup> You are encouraged to contact your county clerk with any questions.

Your county clerk will automatically mail ballots to active registered voters between October 13, 2020 and October 27, 2020.<sup>60</sup> If you are registered to vote in San Juan County, your ballot may be mailed sooner.<sup>61</sup> If you do not receive a ballot shortly after this time, immediately contact your county clerk's office: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

You can use the following link to update the address to which you would like your ballot sent, but you must do so no later than Friday, October 23, 2020: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.<sup>62</sup>

**21. APPLICATION RETURN: Where and/or how can I return my absentee ballot application? Can someone return it for me?**

Your absentee ballot should arrive in a package that includes a return envelope with the name, title, and post office address of an election officer on the front of the envelope.<sup>63</sup> Someone else may return it for you, but the signature on the affidavit in the return envelope with your ballot must match the signature on file with the election officer.<sup>64</sup> This might be relevant if, for instance, your name or signature changed since you last registered. You can update your registration information here: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.

Your mail ballot must be postmarked by the U.S. Post Office before the Election Day.<sup>65</sup> For the 2020 regular general election, this means it must be postmarked by November 2, 2020 at the latest.

To return your ballot by mail, your county may offer prepaid postage.<sup>66</sup> If it does not, you can also drop your ballot off at a drop box location either at your polling place or where your election officer has designated before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.<sup>67</sup> To find a drop box near you, use this link: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.

Even if your county does not offer prepaid postage and you cannot make it to a drop box, you may place your ballot in the mail without postage, and the Postal Service will still deliver your ballot to your county clerk's office.<sup>68</sup>

**22. DIDN'T REQUEST IN TIME: What if I have not requested an absentee ballot by the deadline?**

For the 2020 regular general election, you should automatically receive an absentee ballot if you are an active registered voter.<sup>69</sup> You can use this link to determine if you are: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-voter/voter-info>.

You may need to update the address where you would like your ballot sent. You can do this using the following link but you must do so no later than Friday, October 23, 2020: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.<sup>70</sup>

**23. ELIGIBILITY: Do I have to have a specific reason for requesting to vote by absentee ballot?**

No. For the 2020 regular general election, all active registered voters will receive an absentee ballot regardless of whether one was requested.<sup>71</sup>

**24. STATUS OF APPLICATION AND/OR BALLOT: How can I check the status of my application and/or absentee ballot?**

You can track the status of your mail ballot by visiting this page: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-voter/track-mail-ballot>.<sup>72</sup>

**25. APPLICATION AND/OR BALLOT REJECTED: I learned my absentee ballot application and/or ballot was rejected. What can I do to fix any errors or get another one?**

You can fix errors by completing and returning an affidavit to the election officer that:

- Attests that you voted the ballot;
- Enter your name, date of birth, and either your driver license number or the last four digits of your social security number;
- Is signed by you; and
- States that by signing the affidavit, you authorize the lieutenant governor and county clerk to use your signature on the affidavit for voter identification purposes.<sup>73</sup>

**26. COMPLETING BALLOT: How do I complete the absentee ballot? Are there any identification requirements?**

Complete the following steps:

- Mark the appropriate space with a mark opposite the name of each candidate you intend to cast a vote for;
- Complete and sign the affidavit on the return envelope (if you are not sure if you signed the affidavit, sign the outside of the envelope);
- Place the voted ballot in the return envelope;
- Securely seal the return envelope; and
- Either attach postage, if necessary, and deposit the return envelope in the mail before the deadline, or place the return envelope in a ballot drop box that is designated by the election officer for the precinct where you reside.

If you place your ballot in a drop box in the wrong jurisdiction, an election officer may, but is not required to forward your ballot.<sup>74</sup>

The signature on the affidavit in the return envelope with your ballot must match the signature on file with the election officer.<sup>75</sup> If, for instance, your name or signature changed since you last registered, you need to update your registration information. You may do so here: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.

If you are registering to vote for the first time and voting by mail, you may need to provide a copy of your valid Utah driver license or valid Utah ID to your county clerk's office.<sup>76</sup> If you are mailing a provisional ballot, you may also be required to provide proof of residence. Please contact your county clerk with any questions. <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>

**27. LOST OR SPOILED: What if I lost my absentee ballot or it is spoiled or I received an incorrect one?**

If this happens, contact your county clerk. Please find their contact information here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

If you spoil a ballot, you may receive others, one at a time, after you return each spoiled one.<sup>77</sup>

If you receive a spoiled ballot, the poll worker will give you a new ballot.<sup>78</sup>

**28. NON-RECEIPT OF BALLOT: What if I requested an absentee ballot but have not received it? Can I do anything?**

For the 2020 regular general election, your county clerk will automatically mail ballots to active registered voters between October 13, 2020 and October 27, 2020.<sup>79</sup> If you are registered to vote in San Juan County, your ballot may be mailed sooner.<sup>80</sup> If you do not receive a ballot shortly after this time, immediately contact your county clerk's office: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

You can also use this link to update where you would like your ballot sent, but you must do so no later than Friday, October 23, 2020: <https://vote.utah.gov/>.<sup>81</sup> Ballots may not be forwarded.

**29. IN PERSON OPTION: What if I requested an absentee ballot but I want to vote in person on Election Day?**

You can.

You may still vote at your polling place, so long as you have not returned your ballot by mail.<sup>82</sup>

**30. BALLOT DEADLINES: What is the deadline for the ballot to be postmarked and/or received by, including dropping it off in person?**

Your mail ballot must be postmarked by the U.S. Post Office the day before the Election Day.<sup>83</sup> For the 2020 regular general election this means it must be postmarked by November 2, 2020.

Before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, you can drop your ballot off at a drop box location either at your polling place or in locations designated by your election officer.<sup>84</sup> You can find a drop box location here: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.<sup>85</sup> For the 2020 regular general election, this means your ballot must be deposited before 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. If you place your ballot in a drop box in the wrong jurisdiction, an election officer may, but is not required to forward your ballot.<sup>86</sup>

**31. BALLOT DROP OFF LOCATIONS: What are the locations for dropping off a completed ballot (instead of mailing it)?**

Before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, you can drop your ballot off at a drop box location either at your polling place or in locations designated by your election officer.<sup>87</sup> You can find a drop box location here: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.<sup>88</sup>

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If you place your ballot in a drop box in the wrong jurisdiction, an election officer may, but is not required to forward your ballot.<sup>89</sup>

### **32. ASSISTANCE DROPPING OFF: Can someone drop off my completed ballot for me?**

Yes, however, there should be only one ballot in each envelope because there must be an affidavit signature for each ballot.<sup>90</sup>

### **33. IN PERSON ABSENTEE: Where do I vote in-person absentee?**

At your polling place, so long as you did not vote by mail.<sup>91</sup>

For the 2020 regular general election, Utah encourages voters to vote by mail.<sup>92</sup>

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## HOW TO VOTE: ELECTION DAY

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### **34. HOURS: When do the polls open and close on Election Day? What if the polls are closing but I'm in line?**

Polls at all elections on the date of the election must open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m. that day.<sup>93</sup>

Every voter who arrives at the polls by 8 p.m. is allowed to vote.<sup>94</sup> For the 2020 regular general election, this includes being in line at an outdoor voting station by 8 p.m. if your county allows outdoor voting.<sup>95</sup>

### **35. POLLING LOCATION: Where do I vote on Election Day?**

You may cast a vote in person at your polling place. If you have moved recently and not updated your voter registration, refer to [Questions #6 and 7](#).

You may also drop your ballot in a drop box either at your polling place or at a location that your election officer has designated. Your ballot must be deposited before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.<sup>96</sup> You may find a drop box location here: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.<sup>97</sup>

You may contact your county clerk with any questions: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

**36. IDENTIFICATION: What identification is required to vote on Election Day? Can I vote without providing identification?**

To vote in person in Utah, you must have:<sup>98</sup>

**ONE** primary form of ID that is valid (not expired), has your name, and has your photograph. These types of IDs include:

- Utah driver license
- ID card issued by the state of Utah or the US Government
- Utah concealed carry permit
- US passport
- Tribal ID card (does not require a photograph)

**OR (see next page)**

**TWO** forms of ID that, when combined, prove your name and current residence. These types of IDs may include:

- Utility bill dated within 90 days of the election
- Bank or other financial account statement
- Certified birth certificate
- Valid Social Security card
- Check issued by the state or federal government
- Currently valid Utah hunting or fishing license
- Currently valid US military ID card
- Certified naturalization documents (NOT a green card)
- Certified copy of court records showing the voter's adoption or name change
- Bureau of Indian Affairs card
- Tribal treaty card
- Medicaid or Medicare or Electronic Benefits Transfer card
- Currently valid ID card issued by a local government within Utah
- Currently valid ID card issued by an employer
- Currently valid ID card issued by a college, university, technical school, or professional school in Utah
- Current Utah vehicle registration

If you vote by casting a provisional ballot (i.e. same-day voter registration), you will need to show an acceptable forms of ID described above *and* proof of residence.<sup>99</sup> You may still vote in person at a polling place without the above listed identification, but you will cast a provisional ballot.<sup>100</sup> For this provisional ballot casted in person to count, you must present your valid voter identification and proof of residence to the county clerk at the county's clerk's office or to an election officer administering the election by close of normal office hours on the Monday after the election.<sup>101</sup>

If you are voting by mail and registering to vote for the first time, you will need to provide a copy of your valid Utah driver license or valid Utah ID to your county clerk's office.<sup>102</sup>

Your vote will not count if you cast a provisional ballot, either in person or by mail, and an election officer determines you are not registered to vote and your provisional ballot cannot be treated as a registration form, or that you are not legally entitled to vote the ballot.<sup>103</sup>

- To be treated as a registration form:
  - You must be otherwise legally entitled to vote the ballot,
  - The ballot must be identical to the one for the precinct where you reside;
  - The information on the provisional ballot form must be complete; and
  - You must provide valid voter identification and proof of residence to the poll worker.
- To be legally entitled to vote the ballot you must:<sup>104</sup>
  - Be a citizen of the United States;
  - Have been a resident of Utah for at least the 30 days immediately before the election;
  - Be of appropriate age; and
  - Currently reside within the voting district or precinct where you are applying to vote.

Please see the section titled “Register to Vote,” especially questions three and eight, for further information on how to determine residence.

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## POLLING PLACE ISSUES

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### **37. POLLING PLACE NOT OPEN: The polling place is not open. What do I do?**

Double check that you are at the correct address and that the polling place is supposed to be open, as the location may have changed.<sup>105</sup> You can use the following link to see how you can vote based on your address: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.

Polls at all elections on the date of the election must open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m. that day.<sup>106</sup> So, if you believe you are at the proper polling place location and it is not open, you should call your county clerk, whose contact information is available here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>.

### **38. LONG LINES: There are long lines at the polling place. What do I do? What if the polls are closing while I’m in line?**

As long as you arrive at the polls by 8 p.m., you are allowed to vote.<sup>107</sup>

For the 2020 regular general election, this includes being in line at an outdoor voting station by 8 p.m.<sup>108</sup>

### **39. EQUIPMENT FAILURE: What should I do if there are equipment problems at my precinct?**

You should alert a poll worker. A poll worker is someone assigned by an election official to help with an election, voting, or counting votes.<sup>109</sup> Because an election judge is considered a “poll worker,” you should ask to speak with him or her and report the issue.<sup>110</sup>

Election officers are required to repair or provide substitute voting devices, equipment, or electronic ballots, if available, if any poll worker reports that, among other issues:<sup>111</sup>



- The voting devices or equipment do not contain the appropriate electronic ballot information;
- The safety devices on the voting devices, equipment, or electronic ballots appear to have been tampered with; or
- The voting devices or equipment do not appear to be functioning properly.

Regardless technical difficulties, as long as you arrive at the polls by 8 p.m., you are allowed to vote.<sup>112</sup>

To avoid a delay based on voting equipment, you are encouraged to consider taking your absentee ballot with you, along with copies of the necessary forms of ID if this is your first time registering to vote and you would then be voting by absentee ballot. See question 36 for necessary forms of ID.

**40. NO PPE/COVID: What if my polling place is not enforcing COVID-19 precautions or has run out of supplies?**

You should alert your county clerk. An election officer is required to ensure that an election day voting center is administered according to the requirements of Title 20A of the Utah Code.<sup>113</sup>

For the 2020 regular general election, this includes:

- Requiring poll workers to use protective gear and to wash hands regularly;
- Prohibit ill poll workers from working; and
- Promoting, to the extent practicable, social distancing between poll workers.<sup>114</sup>

If you are concerned that this may be a possibility, you are encouraged to vote by mail or deposit your absentee ballot in a drop box designated by your county clerk.

**41. EQUIPMENT ASSISTANCE: I don't know how to use the voting equipment. Can I get help?**

Yes. You may ask for further instructions, and two poll workers, each from a different political party, will instruct you.<sup>115</sup>

**42. PHYSICAL DISABILITY: I have a physical disability and need assistance. Will my polling place be accessible?**

Yes.<sup>116</sup> Any voter who has a disability or is physically unable to enter a polling place (or, for the 2020 regular general election, unable to otherwise vote), may be given assistance by an individual of the voter's choice.<sup>117</sup> Each polling place is required to have at least one voting booth or device that may accommodate persons with disabilities.<sup>118</sup>

**43. READING/LANGUAGE ASSISTANCE: I am blind, have a physical disability, or cannot read English and require assistance in order to vote. Can I get assistance at the polls?**

Yes.<sup>119</sup> Any voter who has a disability, or is blind, unable to read or write, unable to read or write the English language, or is physically unable to enter a polling place (or, for the 2020 regular general election, unable to otherwise vote), may be given assistance by an individual of the voter's choice.<sup>120</sup>

#### **44. CURBSIDE VOTING: When can I request curbside voting?**

For the 2020 regular general election, if your county provides outdoor voting, you may be allowed to drive up to the voting station.<sup>121</sup>

You are encouraged to check with your county clerk if your county will provide outdoor voting. You may find their contact information here: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>

#### **45. CAMPAIGNING: What rules apply to people campaigning or “hanging around” my polling place? Can people approach me?**

An individual may not conduct any electioneering, or circulate cards or handbills of any kind, solicit signatures to any kind of petition, or engage in any practice that interferes with the freedom of voters to vote or that disrupts the administration of the polling place, when the individual taking these actions does so within a polling place or within 150 feet of the building where a polling place is located.<sup>122</sup>

#### **46. CHALLENGES: Someone is formally challenging my vote. What do I do?**

Make sure that the individual challenging you is doing so for one of the reasons below, and that the individual challenging you is a poll worker, a watcher, or an individual who resides in the jurisdiction to which the election relates.<sup>123</sup>

If your right to vote is challenged at the polling place, a poll worker will record the challenge, and you will be asked to provide valid voter identification.<sup>124</sup> Even if the poll worker is unsatisfied that you have provided valid voter identification, you will be given a provisional ballot and allowed to enter the voting booth.<sup>125</sup>

You may be challenged for one of the following reasons:<sup>126</sup>

- You are not the person whose name you are using to try to vote;
- You are not a resident of Utah (see questions three and eight above for a discussion on what it means to be a resident);<sup>127</sup>
- You have not or will not have resided in Utah for 30 days immediately before the date of the election (see questions three and eight above for a discussion on how to determine residence);
- Your principal place of residence is not in the voting precinct that you claim;
- Your principal place of residence is not in the geographic boundaries of the election area;
- You have already voted in the election (for example, you returned an absentee ballot and later try to vote in person);
- You are not at least the minimum age required to vote in the election;
- You have been convicted of a misdemeanor for an offense under Title 20A of the Utah Code and your right to vote in an election has not been restored;
- You are a convicted felon and your right to vote in an election has not been restored; and
- You do not meet the political party affiliation requirements for the ballot you seek to vote in a regular primary election or presidential primary election.

If you are validly challenged and do not resolve the issue, you may be required to cast a provisional ballot.<sup>128</sup> If you are later determined eligible to vote, your provisional ballot will be counted. To determine if you are eligible to vote, please see the section titled “Registration to Vote” above.

**47. POLICE/MILITARY PRESENCE: There are police/members of the military at the polling place. Is this okay? What do I do?**

A person is neither allowed to:

- Induce or compel you to vote or keep from voting, directly or indirectly, by intimidation, use of force, violence, or restraint; nor
- Impede, prevent, or otherwise interfere with the free exercise of your right to vote.<sup>129</sup>

If you believe your right to vote is impeded, prevented, or otherwise interfered with by another individual, even by a member of the police or military, you are encouraged to report it to the police. You can also report this behavior to your local clerk: <https://voteinfo.utah.gov/county-clerk-contact-information/>

If you are concerned about these circumstances, you may consider mailing your absentee ballot so that it either postmarked by the U.S. Post Office the day before Election Day or drop it off in an appropriate drop box before 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.<sup>130</sup> You may use this link to find a drop box near you: <https://votesearch.utah.gov/voter-search/search/search-by-address/how-and-where-can-i-vote>.

**48. PROVISIONAL BALLOT: I have been offered a provisional ballot. What should I do?**

You should ask why you are given a provisional ballot and follow directions of the election officials.

You will be asked to cast a provisional ballot when:<sup>131</sup>

- Your name is not found on the official register;
- The poll worker is not satisfied that you have provided valid voter identification (see question 36); or
- Your right to vote is challenged for one of the following reasons:<sup>132</sup>
  - You are not the person whose name you are using to try to vote;
  - You are not a resident of Utah (to be a resident of Utah, generally, this means you must intend to live in Utah permanently or indefinitely)<sup>133</sup>
  - You have not or will not have resided in Utah for 30 days immediately before the date of the election;
  - Your principal place of residence is not in the voting precinct that you claim;
  - Your principal place of residence is not in the geographic boundaries of the election area;
  - You have already voted in the election (for example, you returned an absentee ballot and then later try to vote in person);
  - You are not at least the minimum age required to vote in the election
  - You have been convicted of a misdemeanor for an offense under Title 20A of the Utah Code, and your right to vote in an election has not been restored;
  - You are a convicted felon and your right to vote in an election has not been restored; or
  - You do not meet the political party affiliation requirements for the ballot you seek to vote in a regular primary election or presidential primary election.

After you receive your provisional ballot, you may then choose whether to vote it. If you are later determined eligible to vote, your provisional ballot will be counted. Your vote will not count if you cast a

provisional ballot and an election officer determines that you are not registered to vote and your provisional ballot cannot be treated as a registration form, or that you are not legally entitled to vote the ballot.<sup>134</sup> To determine if you are eligible and entitled to vote, please see the section titled “Registration to Vote” above.
